## 2025-26 School Description and Mission Statement

Riego Creek Elementary is the 20th school in the Roseville City School District. It opened its doors to the West Roseville community in the fall of 2020. Riego Creek, proudly known as the Home of the Raptors, serves approximately 815 students in grades TK–5, and continues to grow each year.

Riego Creek Vision:

Riego Creek Elementary empowers every student to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally in a safe, inclusive, and supportive learning community. We envision a school where all learners are celebrated, challenged, and prepared to make a positive impact in their world.

Riego Creek Mission:

Our mission is to provide high-quality instruction, meaningful relationships, and a positive school culture rooted in our Raptor values of being Safe, Responsible, and Respectful. Through collaboration, innovation, and multi-tiered systems of support, we ensure that all students are engaged, motivated, and equipped with the skills they need to become lifelong learners and caring community members.

Riego Creek teachers have received extensive training and ongoing support to integrate a variety of educational technologies into the district-approved curriculum. Another major focus of the Roseville City School District and Riego Creek Elementary is MTSS—ensuring effective, high-quality instruction and a strong Response to Intervention system that supports all students at their individual levels of academic achievement. Teachers implement Multi-Tiered Systems of Support daily, alongside PBIS tiered practices. They meet regularly in site-based learning teams to analyze assessment data, develop curriculum, and monitor student progress. Staff members also collaborate in Professional Learning Communities, with dedicated time provided by the Roseville City School District, to strengthen instructional strategies and improve student learning outcomes.

## 2025-26 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

Roseville City Elementary held a public hearing on September 25, 2025, and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, or science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. the State of California. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home. Textbooks and supplementary materials are adopted according to a cycle developed by the California Department of Education, making the textbooks used in the school the most current available. Materials approved for use by the State are reviewed by all teachers and a recommendation is made to the School Board by a selection committee composed of teachers and administrators. All recommended materials are available for parent examination at the district office prior to adoption.

## School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

### General

The District takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the District uses a facility survey instrument developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction. The results of this survey are available at the Maintenance Office.

### Maintenance and Repairs:

District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The District annually inspects wheelchair lifts, tests fire extinguishers, inspects and services all playground backboards, replaces bark on playgrounds and landscaping, and services HVAC units.

### School Facility Repair Status:

Overall Summary-Exemplary

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

The inspection included a check of possible gas leaks, mechanical systems, interior and exterior doors and windows, interior surface areas, structural damage, electrical, playground equipment, and hazardous materials. In all areas this school passed inspection.

Cleaning Process and Schedule:  
The District has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the District. The principal works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

Deferred Maintenance Budget:  
The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems. Since 2008-2009 the State has suspended the program due to State Budget Reductions. The District still maintains its own program.

2025-26 School Safety Plan

The Roseville City School District has developed a Crisis Response Plan that outlines the procedures to be followed in the event of an emergency affecting a school site. The plan includes procedures for coordinating resources to respond to any emergency, including natural disasters, environmental health issues, accidents, or intruders. Riego Creek Elementary staff have been assigned roles and trained to work efficiently with each other and with other public service officers to ensure the safety of students and staff.

Riego Creek Elementary has a Comprehensive School Safety Plan, which is reviewed annually with the site leadership team and site council. The plan is also reviewed throughout the year with the staff as drills occur, to ensure procedures are carried out as effectively as possible. Evacuation, shelter, secure, and lockdown drills are held to practice procedures for evacuation and safety. The staff and students are updated on safety practices.

Riego Creek Elementary School's Comprehensive School Safety Plan was developed with input from the district, staff, and parents. The plan was reviewed and approved on December 3, 2025, by the staff and School Site Council. It will go to the board in February 2026 for approval.
